INTERMINISTERIAL NEWS

An update of what is happening

Leveraging our strengths

There are at least monthly, if not close to weekly training workshops or video conferences offered across Ontario related to dual diagnosis and/or challenging behaviour. The Community Networks of Specialized Care have been leaders in this achievement. Over the next 3 years NADD Ontario will be focusing the further development of knowledge and skills at a

program and client level through accreditation and certification. There are also actions, with minimal effort, that can be undertaken now to advance our current efforts. For your consideration:

- Align training with annual Regional and/or Network priorities for service development and coordination
- Articulate the intended audience for training (e.g. generalist or advanced generalist) and the knowledge and/or skill competencies to be gained from attending (refer to Levels of Practice for Supporting Individuals with Dual Diagnosis, 2003)
- Implement a consistent approach to evaluating training including follow up assessments to measure skill acquisition (knowledge transfer)
- Partnerships between developmental and mental health specialized providers as well as academic institutions to enrich cross sector relationships and pedagogy.

PARTNERSHIP IN ACTION

The Collaborative and Individualized Resource (CAIR) Program and Alternate Level of Care (ALC) Clinic work jointly to transition and stabilize complex clients in the Toronto community – be that family home, group home, hospital, or treatment beds – while building capacity among agencies and caregivers to better support clients presenting with challenging behavior and similar complex needs. The CAIR program, funded by MCSS, works with the client's circle of care to develop a comprehensive and interprofessional clinical plan in order to facilitate the implementation of clinical recommendations. Staffing for CAIR is provided by Griffin Centre and CAMH.

Clients who have been designated Alternate Level of Care (ALC) reside on hospital inpatient units within the Toronto Central (LHIN), or within high support treatment beds within the Toronto Network of Specialized Care (TNSC) but are understood to have the ability to be maintained within community settings, given the appropriate resources. The Dual Diagnosis ALC Clinic at CAMH (funded by TCLHIN),offers behavioural assessment and intervention services to aid in the transition of clients into community settings, to support the implementation of behavioural recommendations identified in the clinical plan, as well as facilitate in-depth behavioural training for agencies, staff, and families.

Both CAIR and ALC have a pool of resources available to support the transitional process, and implementation of programming and training for the receiving provider. These resources allow ALC clients to move from higher support placements (such as hospital or treatment beds) to lesser support community placements (group homes). The ALC resources remain involved for up to 2 years.

2012 Financial Report

The NADD Ontario financial position continues to follow the trend of expenditures being slightly higher than revenue. In 2012 expenses were \$2212.26 more than revenue, but \$4719.92 less than 2011. The difference between 2011 and 2012 is a result of no major projects being undertaken. Cash balance on hand as of December 31, 2012 was \$44,513.97 compared to \$46,612.26 in 2011.

Revenue in 2012 totaled \$7,096.17 which is \$3,290.21 less than 2011. This is due in part to decreasing book sales and a drop in membership rebate revenue from The National Association for Dual Diagnosis (NADD) for 2012. Despite this, these two items remain the primary sources of revenue for NADD Ontario.

Significant expenses for 2011 include:

Logo Redesign – Brock Ostrom Design - \$1.356.00 NADD Membership honorarium for student Conference attendees - \$988.14.

There was no significant year over year changes in other income or expense lines.

Copies of transaction registers and bank statements are sent to NADD for review by their auditors.
